PROGRESS REPORT ON GG UNDERSTANDING

Some months ago, I undertook a study of the number of FPE applicants who had achieved some liveable degree of understanding and/or acceptance from their wives. It seemed timely because no data had been gathered or analyzed in the last couple of years. I was curious to see if any changes had taken place in the number of new members who have been able to win their wives over or if things were as they had been in this most important part of TV married life. I am very pleased to announce that the GG situation has definitely changed for the better.

Now before we go any further, I must confess that I am not a trained statistical analyst, but I can count "yesses", "noes" and "maybe's" as well as anyone. So to establish a criteria not too unlike Susanna's now famous wife classification article, I set up the following categories. Group No. One had three classes of TV-GG relationships: A - Completely Understanding, Example: goes out with TV and will attend meetings, etc. B - Permits at home and in her presence. C - Permits when she is not present. In Group No. Two, there are also three classes of relationships. D - Knows but is intolerant. E - Knows and is hostile about it. F - Doesn't know about husband's TV desires. Thus with the above specific areas in mind, I took the last fifty FPE applications from married people and classified them according to the responses in questions six and seven of the application, the ones dealing with marital TV status and relationships.

In Group One, there were 33 applicants who have won some workable degree of GG understanding and in Group Two, there were seventeen applicants who had no workable understanding or had not told the wife about "things". Of those who fell into Group One, 12 had "A" wives, 11 had "B" wives and 10 had "C" wives. This is really surprising because the only information available to us up to now, showed that about 25% of the married TVs had gained some measure of understanding and about 30% had never even told their wives that they were TVs.

Thus, our new report, based on fifty applicants(all within the last twelve months) finds that 66% have found a workable solution which includes the wives cooperation and at least a good measure of understanding and/or acceptance. It's also very interesting to find that of the 17 who have not made any progress with

their wives, there were 10 in class "D", 5 in class "E" and 8 in class "F". But, even more important is the fact that most TVs now tell their wives about themselves and of those who do, 66% find understanding and helpful acceptance and 40% don't seem to mind or at least put their husband's welfare first and learn to live with the problem quite well.

Now we must remember that fifty married couples involved with TVism is no great number, but we must also remember that these fifty TVs and their fifty GGs are also new members. Most of these people have not met another TV nor has the wife talked with a TV wife at the time of application. This fact is most significant. It should also be stated that the average age of these applicants is appreciably younger than that of the average applicant of a few years ago.

Thus, we would have to conclude that TV information and the right kind of information is much more readily available today and the process of education with both the TV and the wife is better and more meaningful than ever before. In most of these cases, the "Wives Book" has been read along with numerous issues of TVia as well as other information made available in the last year or so. Personally, I never thought that the day would come that the understanding wife is the rule rather than the exception, but it is apparently here. We should all take heart in this achievement (regardless of our personal situation) because we have all contributed in some small way to help bring this about. The second edition of the "TV and His Wife" was a big break-through and its true significance is not yet counted up. So I felt that you should all know about what must be termed as real progress and we can all be proud of our total efforts, together with Virginia's magnificent leadership in helping others as we have all promised and hoped to do.

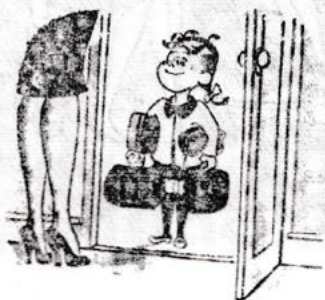

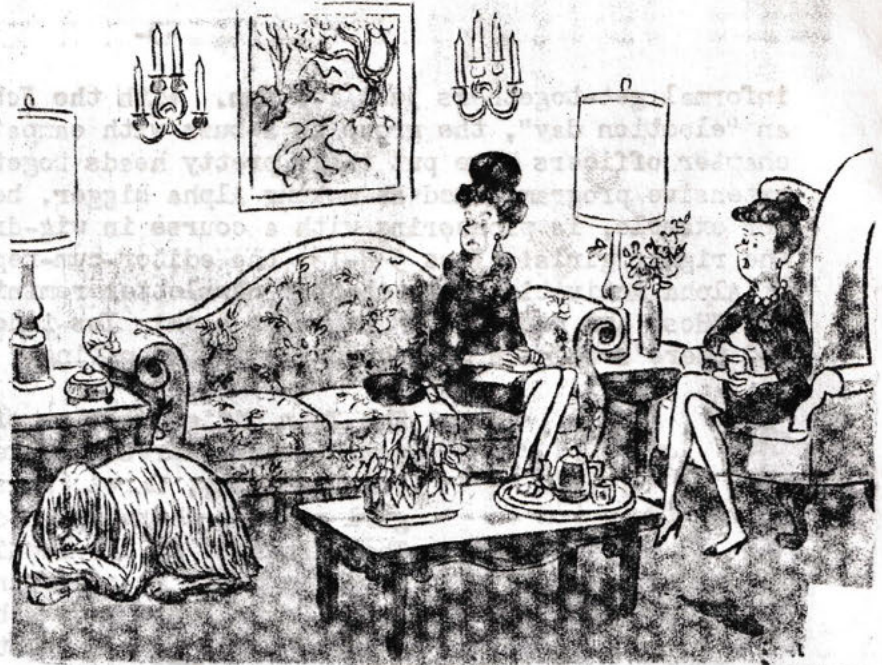

RECENT OFFERINGS IN TV LITERATURE - By Jeri 49 K-3

Followers of Time magazine book reviews will have noted three recent references to Gore Vidal's latest book, Myra Breckenridge (Little, Brown-\$5.95). Basically, the story of a transexual, not a transvestite(noteces totthe contrary), the novel includes no references as such to traditional TV embellishments, such as wardrobe, desire for-or fascination with-with assumption of a differing gender-role, or

even subjective feelings toward the assumed role. Myra/Myron, the title character and narrator, seldom if ever offers anything but an objective view of (his) own character.

As a matter of fact, this is the whole point of the book, it seems. Myra's comment to the effect that she represents the New Woman, is amplified by personal reflections that have as their referents, the plots, dialogues and cliches of (primarily) pre-1945 movies. This seems to be Vidal's announced end as well (see Time, Feb. 16, 1968).

It is probably as significant as Vidal claims that many of our present day attitudes have been formed with reference to the movies. In more ways than one, the movies of the thirties and early forties accomplished for the Depression and post-depression era what the medieval Catholic Church did in that era. And, it seems entirely possible that Vidal is relying to a certain extent on the similarity between the emergence of the New Woman of the current day, with the emergence of the Virgin in the doctrine and dogma of the Middle Ages. (If any reader takes offense at this casual suggestion, I refer him to the more scholarly treatment of the same theme in The Education of Henry Adams, particularly the "Dy Name and the Virgin", and the fuller exposition in Mont St. Michel et Chartres.

Those looking for the traditional transvestite titillation will seek in vain, but the book has enough merit to warrant borrowing, if not quite so much as to justify the purchase price. It also seems, that Vidal has to a large extent borrowed structural details of the recent Norman's Letter (Lancer paperback, by Gavin Lambert) which deals with something of the same theme, and which may be the better book.

Other offerings in the past several months indicate a growing use of TVism either as a main or secondary theme: these include Georgette Heyer's - The Masqueraders (\$4.95) which uses the mutual masquerade (boy as girl, girl as boy) in England during the Regency period, a period in which Miss Heyer specializes. Costuming details are vivid and extensive in this more-or-less traditional use of transvestism in a plot of politics and historical intrigue.

Norman's Letter, is well worth the reading, although it is only tangentially about TVism; it suffers, wrongfully, from a jacket-blurb reading, "Hang-ups, homosexual style." The literary value lies in the way that two historic themes are united: the feminine dual nature of a man (vide Goethe, and Hesse's Steppenwolf) plus the effort to objectify the feminine existence of man's creative side. The second provides the TV theme as the hero writes poetry under a pseudonym ("Oum") of a mid-Eastern Arab girl, posing for "her" publicity photos, and of course, wearing the silken djellaba while he composes (reminiscent of Wm. Sharp-Fiona McLeod of the 1890's). At his "death", he is buried in the garment by his mother who thus acknowledges this aspect of the hero's basic conflict. However, the reader is left with several tantalizing thoughts at the end of the story. An older sister has become, via the appropriate surgery, a man. After Norman's "funeral", "mother" tracks her down to learn her story. Now, the whole purpose of the end segment depends on some tricky arithmetic, involving the ages of people, and the dates, leaving the reader, once he has done the necessary calculations, with an astonishing conclusion reminiscent of the end of Psycho.

Evergreen Review continues its emphasis that seems geared toward a homosexual reading group (witness the number of advertisements of bookstores selling primarily HO books that appear in current issues). Of interest to the TV in

recent issues are the articles in Evergreen #47-June, 1967, which include a pictorial essay ("Notes from the Underground") on the recent "Miss All-American" contest (also mentioned in a recent Playboy), plus an interview with the winner, Mr. Richard Finocchio (with a name like that, how could he miss?) who also appears in Evergreen #50-Dec. 1967) modelling the latest creations of the fashion world in six pages of photos. There also appears in ER #47 a short story entitled "The Man in the Grey Flannel Skirt," as well as the by-now-famous "Uncensored Unclassifieds" which read a lot like the ads in La Plume, but are downright funny. Both are available from Marboro Books.

A recent short story appears in Nebula Award Stories Two (Doubleday Science Fiction, edited by Brian Aldiss and Harry Harrison), by Frederick Pohl, entitled "Day Million" (originally appeared in Rogue Magazine, 1966), which is the ultimate TV story and worth reading. (Although most TVs would probably not find it worth the \$4.95 for the book, it's only six pages long and as every TV knows, you can't hardly get the hero dressed in that short a space, even--or especially--if he's willing). Check your local library, or watch for the paperback (probably published by Ace PB). TVs are creeping into spy fiction, more and more these days. Next time we will have a run-down on the skirt-and-dagger people.

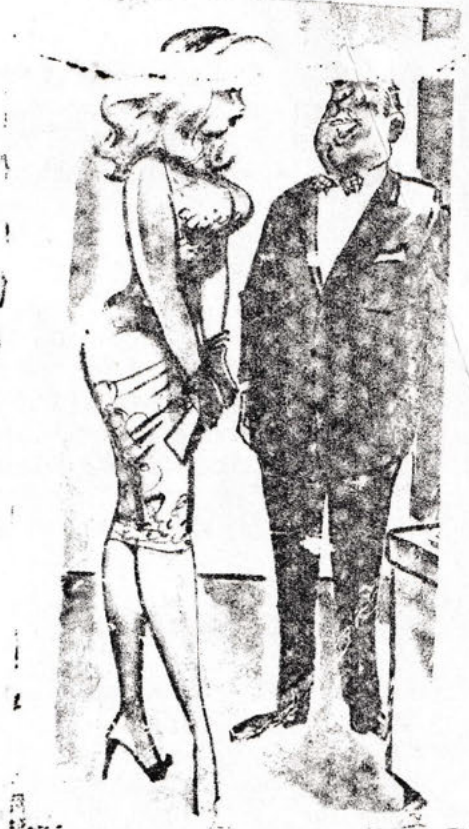
Special Announcement
